

Supply List for Crumbs to Quilts Zoom Workshop

A computer or other primary Zoom device.

A Secondary Zoom Device (like a smart phone or tablet). See video for more information.

All your standard quilting/sewing supplies & equipment:

Please have your cutting mat and rulers near your sewing machine.

An iron and ironing board with (optional) starch or sizing.

White or near white fabric for the background.

We will make at least one, hopefully two blocks in the time allotted. For each tulip block you will need these sized pieces from the background fabric:

- (1) 2" X 2" square
- (1) 2" X 3 ½" rectangle
- (2) 4" X 4" squares
- (3) 3 ½" X 3 ½" squares

Please have at least one set of background fabric squares cut before the class, preferably two sets.

A printed copy of the Crumb Tulip Pattern (A separate .pdf file).

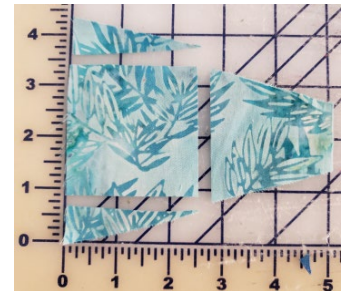
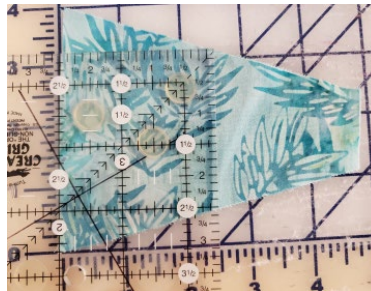
Crumbs (more information below) –



What are Crumbs?

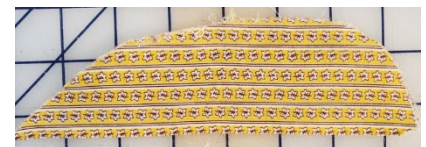
Crumbs are any piece of fabric that is bigger than ¾" on any side and too small to cut a 2 ½" mini charm. The video says 1" because that is what most people are comfortable with but it is possible to use ¾".

If the scrap is big enough, cut a 2 ½" mini charm from, cut the fabric and use the left overs as crumbs. Teeny tiny scraps add a lot of interest to the crumb fabric



How to Prepare Crumbs? Please have all the crumbs ready before the class.

1. Lightly press the fabric. Tightly wrinkled cloth is hard to work with. To save time, you can place 5 or 6 crumbs in a stack and press them all at once.



2. Trim the crumbs to regular shapes. It makes it easier to use the crumbs if they are in shapes with only straight lines.



3. Sort the crumbs by color. The easiest thing is to just put each color into its own zipper bag.

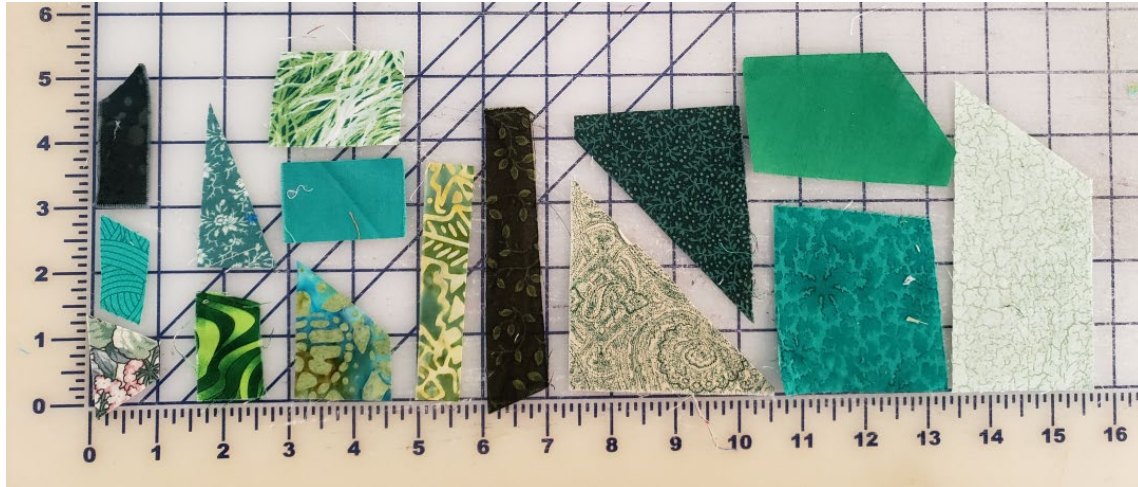
What sort of/ how many Crumbs do I need?

1. What Size Crumbs?

You will need crumbs of assorted different sizes.

Having some very small crumbs will make the project more interesting. The video says 1" minimum, but if you are brave, you can go as small as $\frac{3}{4}$ " on the shortest side.

Yes, it is ok to cut down some larger crumbs to get an assortment for this class.



2. How many crumbs?

That is hard to say exactly. Maybe a fist full? Three or four times the amount shown above. You are only making small blocks, but I have had students who were surprised at how much fabric was needed. Remember these are small pieces and a lot of the fabric will be lost in the seam allowance.

3. What color crumbs?

We will be making flowers of any color you want, but all of the leaves will be green. So, you will need at least a bag of green crumbs. The flowers can be solid (all crumbs in the same color family, like purple) or you can make flowers with multiple colors, the choice is yours.

4. What if I don't have crumbs?

You can easily make your own crumbs from your existing scraps. Make random cuts of various sizes and shapes from a variety of fabrics like seen above.
